GVH HIGHLIGHTS

Medical Team Trips – This year we had 2 amazing US team trips and our in-country team visited villages every 6 weeks in between. For our summer trip, we were joined by 14 students and their professor from the UW Bothell Nursing program (see “UW Bothell” article). With their help we did hygiene education, developed and implemented a nutritional supplement for babies and gathered data on STIs and contraceptive use.

Composting Toilets and Eco-filters – Our goal this year was the distribution of composting toilets and Eco-filters to 200 families to provide sanitation and pure water. Our composting toilet model has been developed and piloted over the past several years with villager’s input. Compost from these toilets is mostly odorless and can be used as fertilizer for trees and bushes. Families contribute the wood, sand and labor to build and maintain them.

Healthy Mothers/STIs & Contraception – Continuing our focus on family planning for health and reduction of poverty, we provide education and access to everything from condoms to IUDs. A nurse manager from the Ministry of Health staff traveled with us to our villages and helped with education and alignment with their standards. A volunteer doctor revised our prenatal care program and trained the traditional birth attendants in how to do preventative care for pregnant women.



Mission: Improve village and individual health in Guatemalan rural villages by educating villagers, empowering local leaders, and developing local health providers.

We are a group of health workers, engineers, teachers, administrators, college students and kids, working in the Rio Dulce area of Guatemala. We are a 501c3 organization based in Seattle, Washington.

Highlights Continued...

Healthy Babies/Macronutrients –

Our program of fluoride, parasite treatment and vitamins along with parental education for all children under 5 years of age continues with increasing enrollment. To fight malnutrition in the most vulnerable first 1000 days of life we are now using a supplement made of commonly available ingredients – Incaparina, milk powder, oil and vitamins with the long-term plan to develop permaculture production of high nutrient foods to provide sustainable nutrition.

Permaculture and our Training and Development Center (CIDECAS) –

Our sister organization Aldeas Sanas is currently housed in Santiago, Sacatapequez in the route from Guatemala City to Antigua. Here we are piloting the Casas Mejoradas project and Permaculture. The goal of Casas Mejoradas is to help families make their houses healthier one step at a time. With permaculture, we are learning how to cultivate plants for food in a sustainable way by creating “food forests” in combination with composting.

"My name is Alejandra Zarazúa de Román. I'm 26 years old and I'm from Guatemala. I'm the third of a four-child family, I got married 4 years ago and I have a 3-year-old child. I studied medicine at the Rafael Landívar University and did my practice mostly in Hospital Roosevelt. I worked during my studies as a volunteer for "Un Techo para mi País" and worked in "Hospitales la Paz" and "Centro integral de atención médica" after graduating. "I believe in collaborative partnerships, community engagement, and the need to prepare the next generation of global public health workforce. In 2015, I was looking for a global health partner, and a colleague referred me to Dr. Jennifer Hoock. After our first phone conversation, I knew I had found a match in GVH. We have a shared value and commitment to health equity and social justice within and across countries.

In summer of 2018, we partnered with GVH for a second trip with a group of 14 students. Together, we have recorded over 1,000 patient encounters. Twenty-six registered nurses in the Masters of Nursing and RN-to-BSN programs, and other health profession students in the team have contributed their skills to improving the health of rural Mayan communities through multiple teaching and research projects while also learning about global health policies and development. The collaborative service-learning experiences have been transformational. The dedication and passion of GVH leadership is like no other."

Composting Toilets

We have built 200 composting toilets throughout five villages. Now that construction is finished, we can begin with education so that it will be a complete success."

"We are very grateful to be giving Eco-filters to each family in the village we work with in Izabal. We have provided 187 Eco-filters so far, and each family has been educated on the proper use and maintenance of the filter. We have completed 85% of the first part of this project. All the families are very grateful for their filters because they have never had an opportunity like this. Because of this we are supervising them closely to ensure proper use. Thanks to Rotary and Guatemala Village Health, these families have purified water and a better quality of life."
